Create Your Greywater System

STEP 1:

Pave the showering/bathing area so that water will not create a puddle on the ground. You can use stone, bricks, cement, or strong wood to pave this area. Raise this area as well to prevent it from eroding the soil by adding more soil.

Materials

You will need:


- a shovel/stick and rake/hoe
- soil, fruit trees
- stone/brick/cement
 for paving
- OPTIONAL: compost (for plant growth),



STEP 2

Find the best way that this shower water can travel down the furrows to reach the plants. You can do this just by seeing where the water from the raised shower position will go. A slope of 1/8th a ft is recommended.

STEP 3

Determine the path from where water will flow from the bathing area to the bottom. Test out the path of the water from the bathing area.

STEP 4

Build a furrow of dirt that leads from the bathing area down to where the plants will be. If there is a lot of water, then build at least 2



furrows. You can build it in a "Y" shape and switch with the trail the water goes down to by closing one off with a coconut or a stone.

STEP 4.5

Another option is to have a pipe that you can move to shift which furrow the water goes into.

STEP 5

Plant your plants! Plants that require more water should be near the water source whereas the ones that need less should be closer to the end of the furrows. Plant along the water source because the roots will dry the furrows faster and create a privacy

STEP 6

Test and check up on your system! Pour water in the furrows and see if the water goes where desired, adjusting as needed. Continue to monitor as the wet and dry seasons come, checking plants for progress and paving again when needed.

 If you want more water to infiltrate the plants, make the furrows wider and flatter
 If you want less water to infiltrate, make the furrows narrower and steeper
 Children are allowed to be near the greywater but should not touch it with their hands as this greywater is not filtered
